48 Hours in Troy, NY

Troy sometimes gets overlooked as a suburb of Albany (just 20 minutes up and across the Hudson River from the capital), but it has come into its own in recent years as enterprising newcomers aim to put this city of 50,000 on the map. A former steel and textile manufacturing center, Troy once produced detachable collars for men's shirts, thus you'll see the nickname "Collar City" around town. At the peak of the Industrial Revolution in the late 1800s, Troy was the 4thrichest city in the United States. Today, another revolution has arrived as Trojans passionate about revitalizing their hometown have gone all in on farm-to-table dining, trendy breweries, unique shopping, and performing arts, all while preserving a mix of Victorian, Greek-Revival, Gothic-Revival, and Georgian architecture. Here's how to enjoy a weekend in an emerging enclave that's on the verge of evolving from hidden gem to hip destination.

FRIDAY



5 pm: Check into your hotel or B&B and get acquainted with Troy. Start out by walking through Central Troy Historic District, which *The New York Times* has called "one of the most perfectly

preserved 19th-century downtowns" in the United States. You'll find art galleries, flea markets, and shops full of stationery, jewelry, sweets, antiques, clothing, kitchen gadgets, books—you name it. But don't forget to look up and check out the architectural masterpieces that surround and contain these shops. The district itself is on the National Register of Historic Places, as are nine specific buildings within it, including the Cannon Building along Monument Square with a rare mansard roof; the white marble Troy Public Library (which has been called "one of the finest works of Italian renaissance architecture in the country"); and the Beaux-Arts Ilium Building.

6:30 pm: Stroll to Peck's Arcade

(https://www.iloveny.com/listing/pecks-arcade/128398/) for a family-style meal and pretty plates of whatever's fresh (pictured above). The menu changes weekly, but it has included dishes like roasted cauliflower (with feta, tomato jam, and dukkah), tagliatelle with lobster sauce, and lamb shank with slow baked beans and confit cabbage. Even though the vibe skews farm-to-table and fine dining, the chef doesn't mind serving veggie burgers, grilled cheese, and hummus on a kids' menu.

8 pm: The variety of innovative entrepreneurial spots in Troy may make you think you're in Brooklyn. The brewery scene is hopping, so to speak, so take your pick. If the weather's nice, try <u>Brown's Brewing Company (https://www.iloveny.com/listing/browns-brewing-co/9691/)</u> or <u>the Hill at Muza (https://www.thehillatmuza.com/)</u>, both with outdoor areas (with sweet views of Troy, the Hudson River, and Albany, should you opt to visit during daylight hours). If it's on the cooler side, try <u>Rare</u>

Form Brewing Company (http://www.rareformbrewing.com/), in what feels like an old warehouse, or local hot spot the Ruck (https://www.getrucked.com/).

SATURDAY

8 am: Fuel up for the day at cool, casual <u>Illium Cafe</u>
(https://www.illiumcafe.com/) (Ilium is Latin for Troy). Go sweet with their cannoli-cream-stuffed waffle topped with bananas foster and chocolate sauce or savory with a pulled duck omelet with goat cheese, cranberry, arugula, and cherries.

9 am: Head up the hill and take a walk through rare species of trees like Catalpa, European Beech, Hawthorne, and Magnolia in Prospect Park (http://www.troyny.gov/departments/parks-recreation/parks-facilities/prospect-park/) in pursuit of Poestenkill Falls—a hidden gem of a waterfall that can freeze beautifully in cold temperatures—and the Uncle Sam Memorial, with an overlook of Albany. The 80-acre park features a playground (pictured), tennis center, and plenty of trails, as well as a neat bit of history; the first African-American graduate of RPI, Garnet Baltimore, designed the park in 1903.

Noon: The Troy Waterfront Farmers' Market is the place to be on Saturdays between 9 am and 2 pm. And before you say, "well, my town has a farmers' market," let us assure you, this is one of the best small city markets in the country, with quality produce, meat (even elk and bison!), and dairy. You'll also find food stalls spanning global cuisine while drawing inspiration from the region's rich farms. Either outside around Monument Square (https://www.iloveny.com/listing/troy-waterfront-farmers-market-(summer)/31412/) from May to October or inside at the Uncle Sam Atrium (https://www.iloveny.com/listing/troy-waterfront-farmers-

market-(winter)/12674/) from November to April, you'll find more than 50 vendors shelling out specialty goods like coffee, hummus, cheese, pesto, herbs, granola, and even treats made out of crickets. Grab lunch while enjoying the live musical performances and plaza-like spaces to sprawl out and people watch.



2 pm: Just off Monument Square is <u>The Arts Center of the Capital Region (https://www.iloveny.com/listing/arts-center-of-the-capital-region/31269/)</u>, which serves as a hub for the creative community. Visitors can take in the center's well-curated exhibitions, which are free and open to the public. It's worth stopping in just to learn about public art programs and other art happenings around Troy. Families with kids may want to check in advance to see if any drop-off art camps or workshops are on offer.

3 pm: Downtown Troy is like an urban planner's dream, with ground floor retail on both sides of the quaint streets. As a result, the city's shopping scene is starting to thrive, with everything from a pioneering book shop with a great section for kids (Market Block Books (https://www.bhny.com/about-mbb), open since 2004) to a homegrown design shop and coffee bar (Superior Merchandise

<u>Company (http://www.superiormerchandise.co/)</u>) to a wine shop with one of the best natural and organic wine selections in the region (<u>22 2nd Street Wine Co. (http://www.winetroy.com/)</u>). You'll also find clothing boutiques, art galleries and even a candy store (Collar City Sweet Shoppe) for a late afternoon pick-me-up.

6 pm: Even picky eaters will be satisfied with dinner at <u>Troy</u> <u>Kitchen (http://troy.kitchen/)</u>, where you can choose from a number of different food stands representing cuisines like Mexican, Halal street food, Jamaican, and Southern comfort food. You'll sometimes find live music there as well.

(http://empac.rpi.edu/) brings world-famous avant-garde musicians and artists for performances and unique experiences—think musicians in a string quartet playing in different areas of the venue so the audience can observe the impact that acoustics have on the music. For sports, depending on the season, you can catch a Tri-City Valley Cats (https://www.iloveny.com/listing/tri-city-valleycats-(minor-league-baseball)-(cl-a-affiliate-of-houston-astros)/10735/) minor-league baseball game (https://www.iloveny.com/blog/post/where-to-watch-baseball-in-new-york-state/) or NCAA ice hockey or basketball at RPI.

9 pm: If you can't catch a show or want to chill out after one, there are plenty of fun bars in Troy. <u>Lucas Confectionery</u>. (http://www.lucasconfectionery.com/), owned by the same folks who run Peck's Arcade, serves natural wines by small producers, craft beer, and small plates in a trendy exposed-brick, -pipe, and -beam environment. <u>Plumb Oyster Bar (https://www.plumb.bar/)</u> offers a creative cocktail and mocktail list along with small plates, sandwiches, and seafood and steak entrees. New in 2018, the berlin Cocktail Lounge (https://www.theberlinlounge.com/)) serves up 1940s and '50s jazz music alongside signature cocktails enjoyed in a comfortable setting transporting you to the hip European city itself.

SUNDAY



9 am: Have a Cuban-Spanish-American breakfast at <u>Carmen's Café (https://carmenscafetroy.com/)</u>. Try the Huevos Flamenco, Flan French Toast, and plantains. And sure, it's before noon, but Carmen's makes homemade sodas (without any sugar!), so break all the rules and sip on some.

10:30 am: Compete against your travel companions at the new-in-2018 Bard & Baker (https://www.bardandbaker.com/) board game cafe. Play a few rounds of CLUE, Bananagrams, Trivial Pursuit, or 500 (!) other options as you sip coffee or tea. Or, if you're craving one more outdoor adventure, go for a walk down to Riverfront Park to take in one last view of the Hudson River before leaving town. The park is home to a Wednesday night concert series in the summer and regularly hosts festivals as well as parts of the farmers market in season, but usually, it's a quiet place to get a glimpse of Troy's evolving waterfront, which includes urban trail extensions and the development of Starbuck Island.

11:30 pm: You've seen a lot of creativity in the businesses of Troy, and now it's your chance to get creative! Kids can create at the Children's Museum of Science and Technology
(https://www.iloveny.com/listing/childrens-museum-of-science-

and-technology/2479/) (pictured), voted one of the top 20 science centers in the US by *Parents* magazine. Mostly hands-on exhibits include a "magnetic ball wall," where kids can make a path for a ball while learning about kinetic energy and gravity and a "skyline toolbox" for them to build 3D structures.

1:30 pm: Grab a late lunch at the fast-casual <u>Muddaddy Flats</u> <u>Quesadillery (https://muddaddyflats.com)</u>, which offers quesadillas like Philly cheesesteak, buffalo chicken, vegan, and more, or try wings (pictured) and all of the meats at Troy's branch of <u>Dinosaur Bar-B-Que (https://www.iloveny.com/listing/dinosaur-bar-b-quetroy/28249/)</u>, made famous in Syracuse.

3 pm: For one more treat before heading home, visit <u>Dutch Udder Ice Cream (https://www.facebook.com/TheDutchUdder/)</u>, which offers rotating flavors like key lime avocado, marshmallow circus peanut, and craft beer ice cream—a nod to the city's brewing success, just one aspect of Troy's transformation that you've seen this weekend.




